The Background

- Your “shop” has been around a while and has a number of people who do things their own way.
- Your network person has spent years making beautiful network diagrams and the management loves them and him.
- He owns his own copy of Visio and his own laptop (I said management loves him).

This can be gender neutral, I was in a hurry.

The Situation

- Your “darling of the diagram” just gave notice that he has been offered a fantastic job cleaning up diagrams for some bigger company.
- In his defiance, he’s making sure you have PDF and VSD copies of all the diagrams.
- He is also available for “off-hours” diagram work.

The Reality

- Management likes their diagrams – a lot!
- Lots of time was invested in the existing diagrams.
- He was the last person running Windows¹ (legacy employee).
- Nobody has the time to rebuild the diagrams.

¹ One can always hope that this will be true some day

What do you do?

- Nothing?
 - Not realistic.
- Buy Windows and Visio?
 - Possible, but that is a machine you won't use for anything else.
 - You could virtualize it, worse things have happened.
 - You are still locked in.

Alternatives exist

- Gliffy – an online HTML5 diagramming tool
- Lucid Chart – also HTML5
- yED – java based
- Creately – runs on most platforms
- Draw.io – Online, cloud based

Alternatives exist

- OmniGraffle – OSX, iOS only
- Google Drawings – basic stuff only
- Open/Libre/Whatever Office – All platforms
- Concept Draw – Windows, OSX
- Calligra Flow – Most platforms
- Inkscape – Most platforms

There are many other options

What do you pick?

- This is not an easy answer.
- It depends...
 - Do you need to build on the old drawings?
 - Do you have a commitment to use FLOSS software whenever possible?
 - Are there security concerns about the drawings?
 - The list goes on...

Personal Experience

- Many pieces of software claim to import Visio
- Most of them actually do, just specific versions (or limited imports)
- The import is not always a quality process and a lot of time could be spent cleaning up
- Very few export Visio, so you will have to accept a format change
 - Of course, this is what you actually want

Privacy Concerns

- I'm not a fan of cloud storage offerings for many things - in particular things that have importance, value or both associated with them.
 - Maybe I'm a bit of a Luddite in this area as there are actually good solutions, however most people will not take the time to do it right.
 - There have been too many data breaches of cloud systems.

My picks?

- I'd probably go with LibreOffice or Inkscape if I needed to use FLOSS
 - They can both import a relatively broad range of Visio files.
 - Neither save in Visio, but we already established we don't consider that an issue.
 - Both save in an open format
 - Xml for LibreOffice
 - SVG for Inkscape (not a complete implementation)

You may be better off using the PDF

- M\$ always manages to find a way to make their storage formats difficult to work with
- In general, the PDF is easier to work with, as the demo will show
